Newcastle United Church Mission Statement As we gather as a faith community, we acknowledge that we are on sacred land rich in the legacy, culture, and spirituality of the Indigenous people. It is home to many First Nations, Inuit, and Métis people. We acknowledge that we live and work on land that is under the Williams Treaty, which has been the traditional territory of the Anishinaabeg, Huron-Wendat and Haudenosaunee Nations, as well as many other Indigenous nations. L: We will join our hearts with all of God's people, offering them to the God who loves us.

A: God fills our hearts, our lives, with overflowing grace.

L: With voices in every tongue, of every faith, we will sing our praises to God.

A: We offer glory and thanksgiving to our God.

L: God of seeds and soil, your feast begins long before a morsel of food touches our lips. You begin with dirt and dust, with water and sun: ingredients that you supplied from the very beginning, knowing we would be hungry, understanding that we would be thirsty. You nourish us and provide for us before breathing life into us. You, O Great Creator, started providing your gifts for us from the very beginning. You began this feast in the soil with your hands, and for that, we give you thanks.

A: God of grain and grapes, you continued preparing for the feast by sending your son, Jesus Christ. You sent him to feed us; by his words and deeds, through his death and resurrection, he became the bread of life and the wine of compassion. Christ is the one who gathers us in, who calls each of us by name, who sets a place for us.

L: For the invitation, for the nourishment, and for Jesus Christ, we give you thanks.

God of wheat and wine, long after your son first gathered his friends around a table in an upper room, your Holy Spirit has continued meeting us at tables:

hand-crafted tables painted with intricate designs

and weathered park benches that serve as a place to eat when needed; tables that are covered with homemade casseroles and tables with quickly opened fast food bags being passed around; tables that are surrounded by friends and families and tables where only one seat is filled. No matter what each table looks like, what food that is served, or who the people are that gather around it, your Spirit meets us still. For your ever-present Spirit, O God, we give you thanks.

God of second helpings, you promise abundance.

Like a mother who heaps another spoonful onto our already full plates, you give more than we need.

Yet, despite your generosity, there are those whose bellies are still empty, and those whose thirst is never quenched.

A: As we celebrate your joyful feast today with our siblings in Christ around the world, we are aware that no amount of singing can hide the sound of grumbling stomachs and parched throats. Help us to trust in your promises. As we eat this bread and drink this cup, may we trust that there is enough to go around. Keep us from hoarding what you have provided so that all of your children might taste and, drink and be satisfied.

L: God of tables and chairs, we pray for all eating spaces around the world today, where believers are gathering despite risk and suffering. We pray for chairs that are empty where loved ones used to sit: for tables in places of conflict where bullets fly and bombs rain down; for spaces that have been ravaged by hurricanes, floods and fires. We also pray for eating spaces that are emotionally unsafe this day: tables where tensions are high and certain topics are off limits; placemats that are not set for someone because of the way they look, who they voted for or who they love.

For all these spaces, tables and chairs where your children gather, Lord, we pray for your peace.

Gracious God, we offer our thanks,

for the whole communion of saint's witness to this feast, and for the ministry of churches around the world who gather with us today. By this broken bread may we each be restored for the work yet to come. By this shared cup may we each be claimed for the proclamation of your Kingdom.

At this shared table may we be united as children of your promise, children of your word, dying and made new again, sent boldly together into the world as servants of your peace.

God of the joyful feast, today in the north and the south, in the east and the west, we are grateful as we meet you around tables full of gifts you have given us. Continue to pour out your Spirit upon us so that when the meal is over and we leave this table, we might be a part of extending every table around the world. Help every meal we share look more and more like your heavenly feast; everyone welcomed, everyone fed, and everyone nourished. In the name of Jesus Christ our Lord, we make this our ministry in your name.

A: Holy, holy, holy are you, God of all, God of each. All creation everywhere joins in praising you. Hosanna in the highest! Blessed is the One who calls us to the Table of life. Hosanna in the highest!

L: As we gather in grand churches and in open fields, as we feast on the finest bread, and drink from crystal cups, we join our sisters and brothers in every place, proclaiming the mystery:

A: Jesus died, so we might know the depths of love; Jesus was raised, so we might know the strength of love; Jesus will come, so we might know God's steadfast love for us. L: And so may we be one with all who share this feast, on this day, of all days, with all your children at every corner of your table. May we share this abundant cup with all those who thirst for your justice. May we share this abundant bread with all those who hunger for your righteousness, May we be united with every corner of your story, united in hope, united in vision, united in purpose, united in ministry in every place.

As this bread is Christ's body for us, send us from this table to be the body of Christ in all the world. Send us with a spirit of courage, a spirit of power and love, that we may be witnesses in all creation to the unending story of your word breathing life into the dust. Keep us faithful, and fruitful, and hopeful, and peaceful, until we come at last to the one table of your Kingdom, to feast with all your saints in the joy of your eternal realm, with you and with your Word, through Christ and in Christ, the one who came for us, died for us, and rose for us, the one who prays even for us

Postlude

History of World Communion Sunday

World Communion Sunday started in 1933 at Shadyside Presbyterian Church in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. Dr. Hugh Thompson Kerr, the church's pastor and moderator of the General Assembly, introduced the idea to foster a greater sense of unity among Christians, reflecting on the interconnectedness of all churches.

The day is marked on the first Sunday of every October and encourages congregations worldwide to celebrate the Eucharist together.

Initially named "World Wide Communion Sunday," the celebration was first recognized by Kerr's church and gradually gained traction in nearby congregations.

By 1936, it was adopted by the U.S. Presbyterian Church as an annual event. This movement toward church unity became more prominent when 1940 the National Council of Churches began promoting it worldwide, aiming to enhance ecumenical cooperation among Christians.

This observance now vividly reminds us of the global nature of the Christian faith. Congregations worldwide share in the sacraments of bread and wine to demonstrate their spiritual connectedness and commitment to peace and unity.

This day is a reflection on the global Christian identity, transcending cultural and denominational boundaries.
